ABOUT THE FAMILY

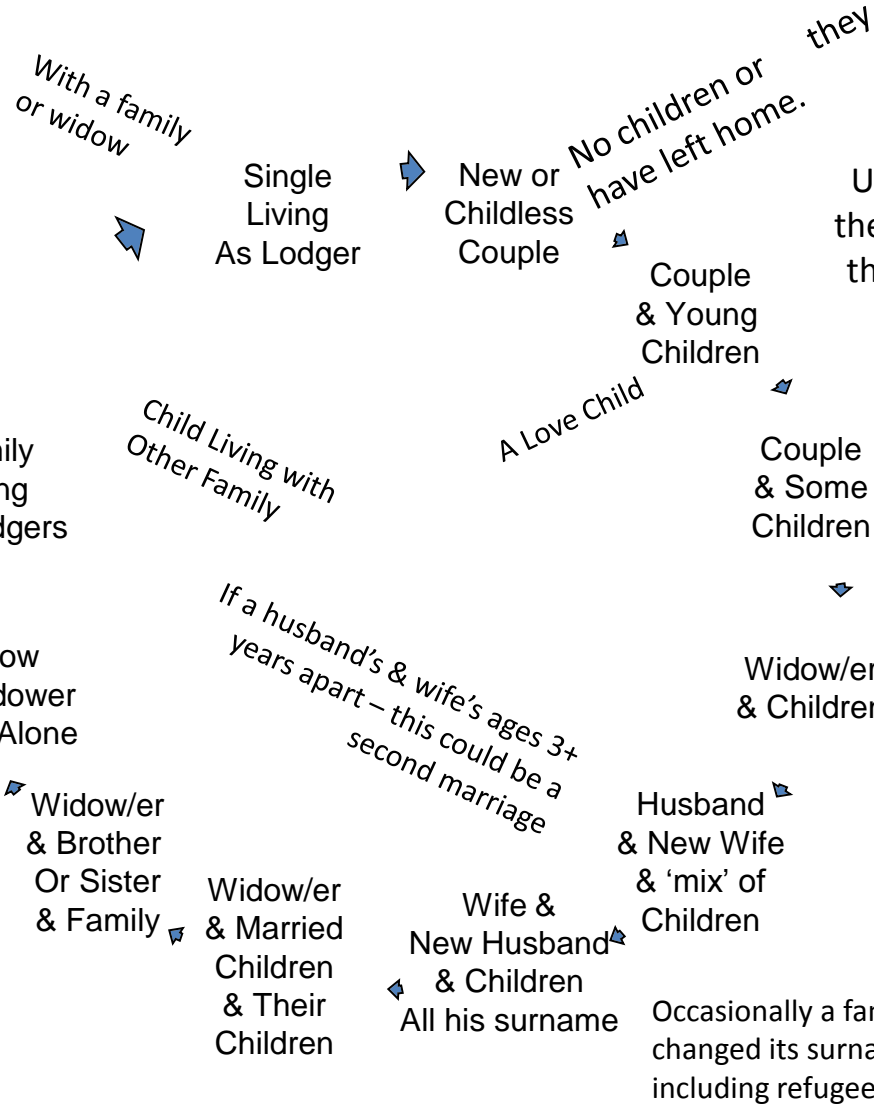
The stages of a family in census records.

IN THE CENSUS, the full Family Group is not usual.⁴⁹

Senior & Junior, e.g. Snr, Jnr, May Distinguish Persons Of The Same Name In A Community – not always Father/Son, Uncle/Nephew, Cousin, etc.

In the past, all Kinsmen were called 'Cousin'. A Cousin-German is a First Cousin.⁵⁰

Children's names – may be found if still at home and voting. Try a sequence of voting records 21+ (or 18+) years after parents' marriage.⁴⁹

Usually children were born after the marriage, & the husband was the 'breadwinner'. Sometimes a widow carried on the family business

Others may be living elsewhere or are dead

Cousins Marrying means Fewer Ancestors

In the Census, a couple remarrying could have his, hers, and their children⁵¹

Occasionally a family changed its surname, including refugee Jews

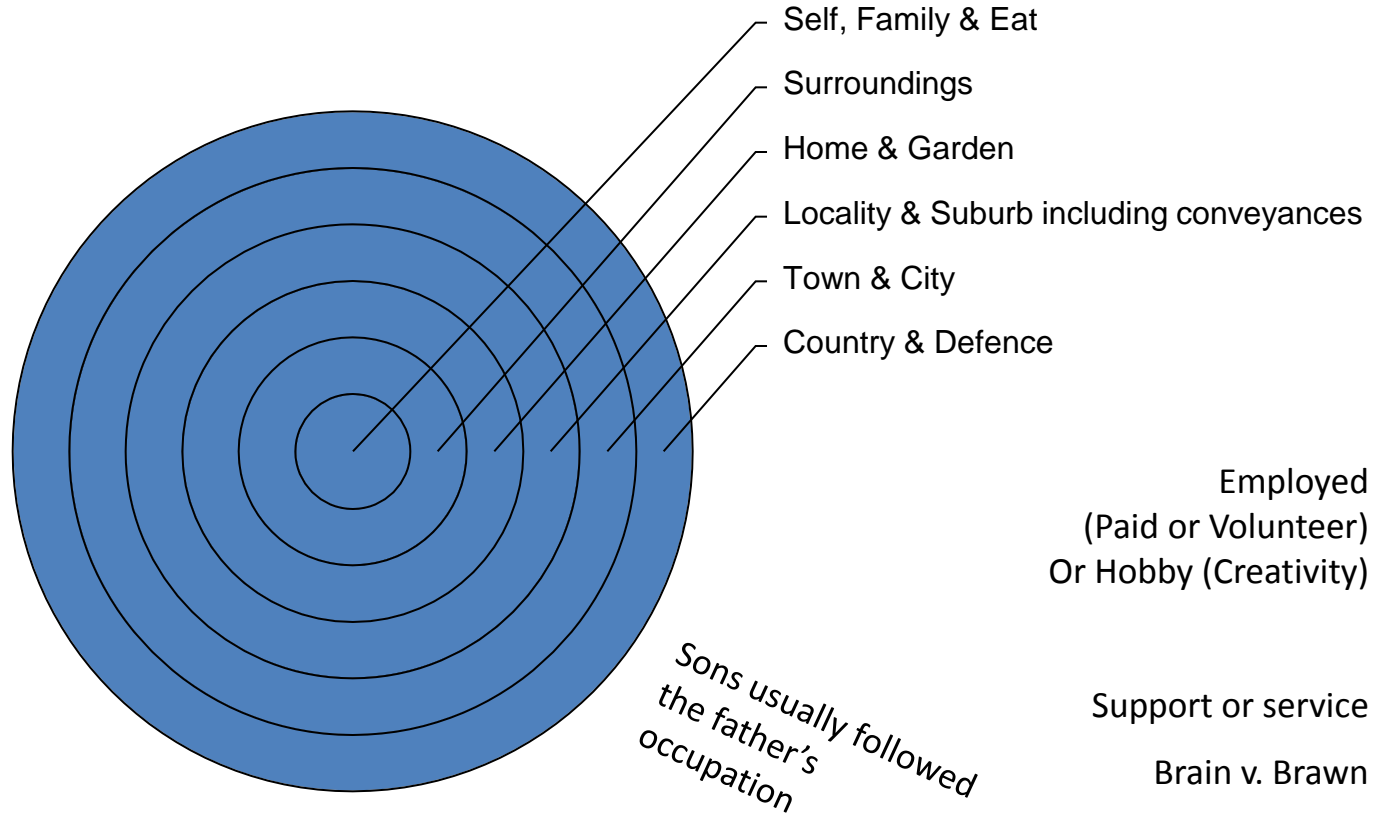

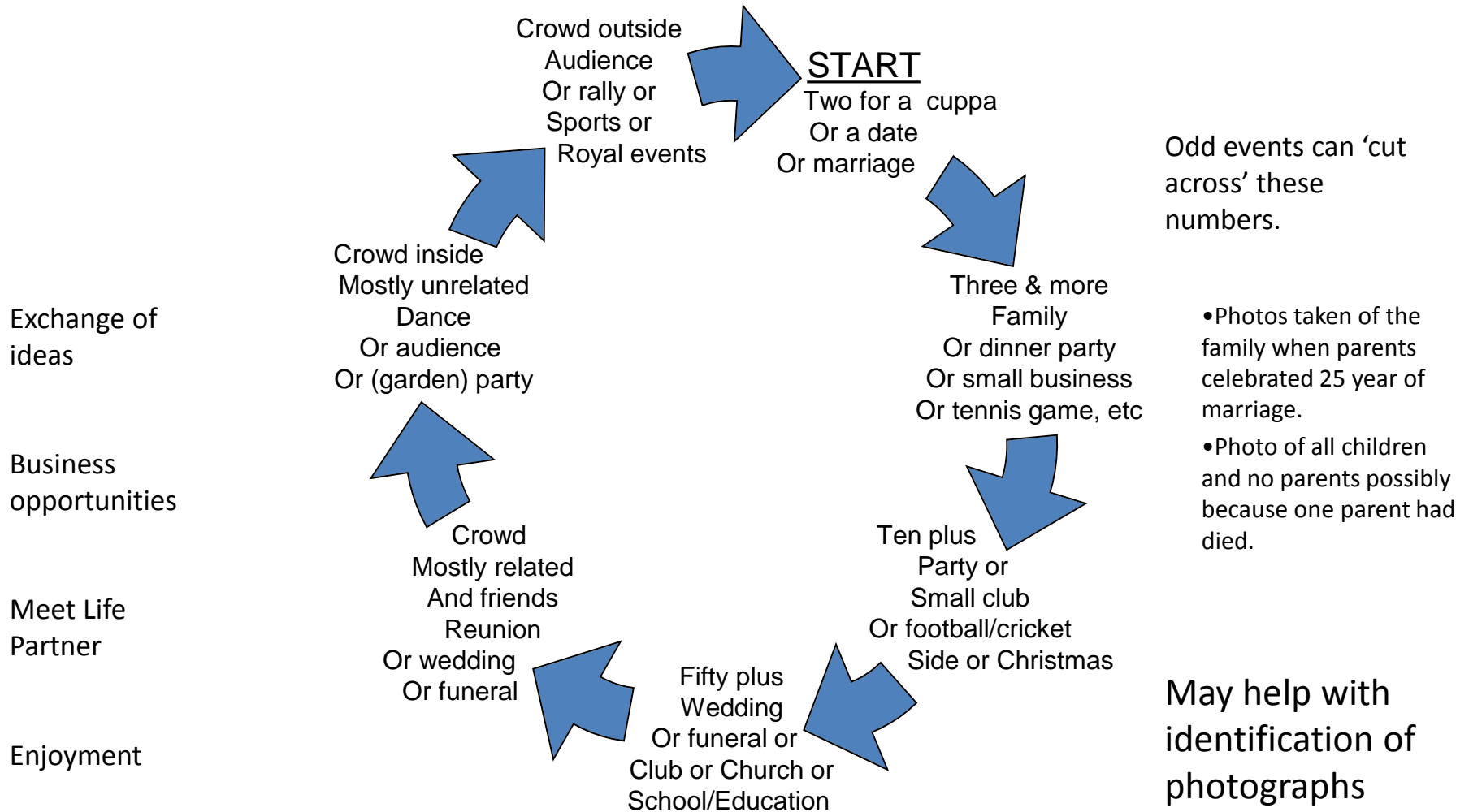

Congregations of people – where people can meet and why.

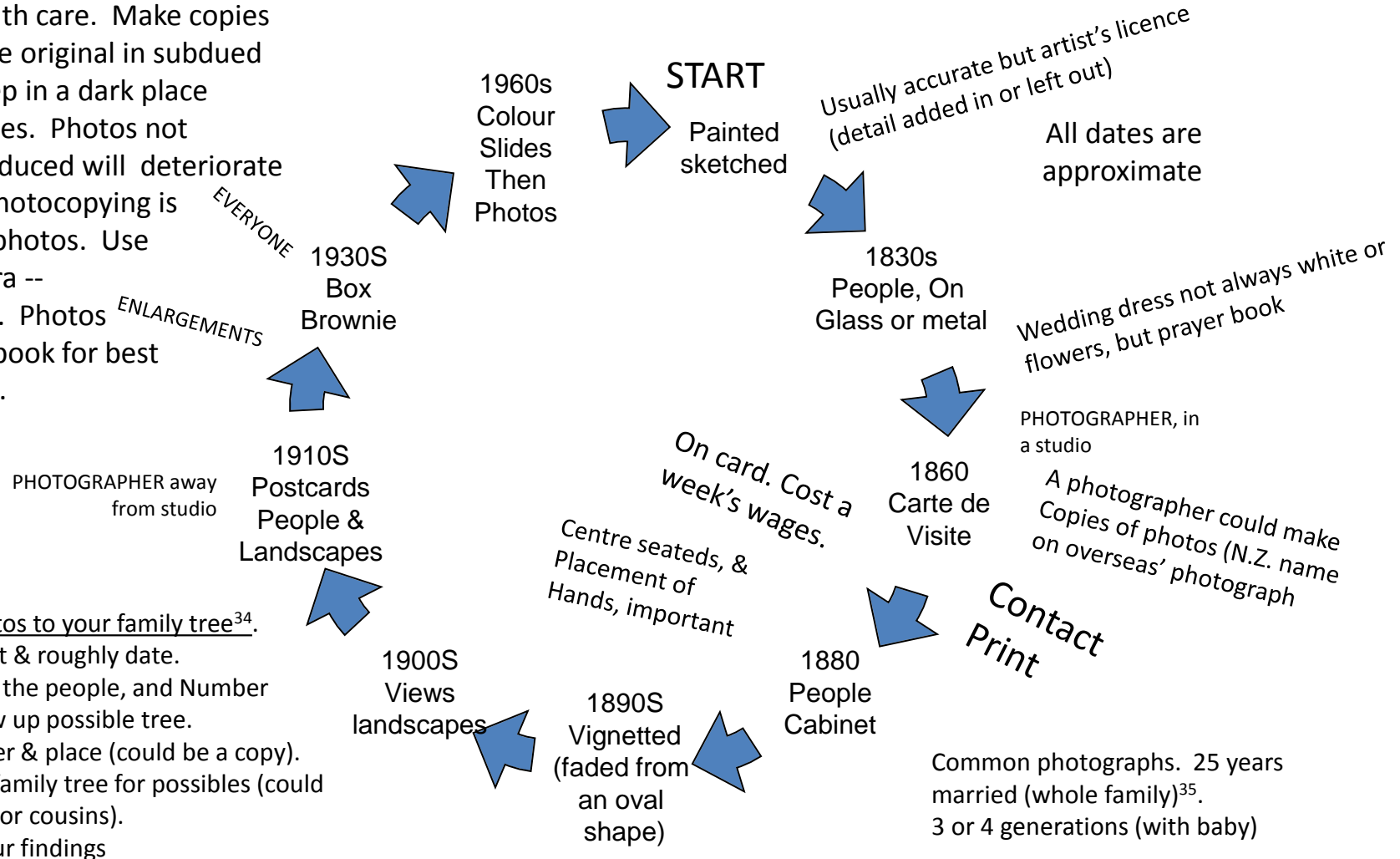


GENEALOGY II ARTEFACTS: ABOUT PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographs: their care and contents.

Best give photographs (& treasures) to children aged 50+ years.

ALWAYS Handle old photos (& other old items) with care. Make copies and enjoy the original in subdued lighting. Keep in a dark place between times. Photos not carefully produced will deteriorate anyway³³. Photocopying is hard on old photos. Use digital camera -- but NO flash. Photos in a printed book for best preservation.



RELATING photos to your family tree³⁴.

1. Decide event & roughly date.
2. Roughly age the people, and Number ...them, & draw up possible tree.
3. Photographer & place (could be a copy).
4. Check your family tree for possibles (could be neighbours or cousins).
5. Write up your findings
